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Overview of 2015 Earthquake

On 25 April, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Nepal causing widespread destruction and loss of life followed by 7.3 magnitude in 12 May.

- 14 districts as severely affected districts
- More than 2.8 million population affected
- More than 1.1 million children affected
- 8,832 casualties
- 22,309 injured

Nepal is disaster prone due to:

- Difficult Geological Terrain, settlement
- Poor construction practices, of unsuitable land

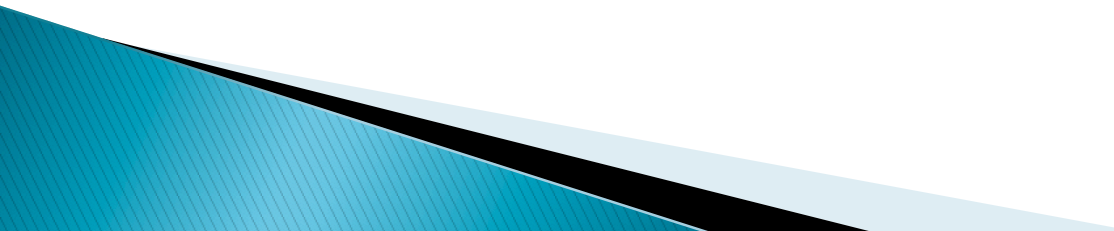
- ▶ Relief and Response is Challenging During Emergency

- ▶ [Facebook photos to “prove” donors did something, or make donors happy]

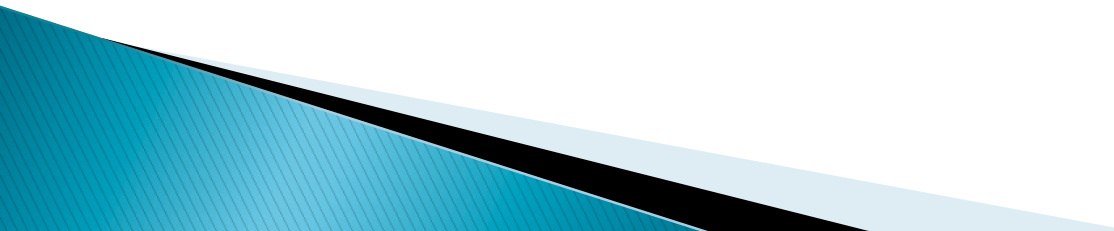


Situation and Gap Analysis

9	Publication through UNISN	1st week of November	Among students and University website




Challenges
